# Contributions by topic

1. Access to territory and access to the asylum procedure (including first arrival to territory and registration, arrival at the border, application of the non-refoulement principle, the right to first response (shelter, food, medical treatment) and issues regarding border guards)

Six years after French authorities dismantled a sprawling migrant encampment on the edge of Calais, large numbers of migrants continue to arrive in northern France, many in the hope of crossing the Channel to reach the United Kingdom.

France tries to dissuade people from staying in the department by mobilizing hundreds of police and gendarmes.

A policy to fight against "fixation points" encouraged by the government and which results in daily evictions from living places, to prevent the creation of anything resembling more permanent living spaces: it is the French State's systematic anticipation of evictions of informal settlements at the border in order to prevent the creation of anything resembling more permanent living spaces. When a living space is created, law enforcement agencies are systematically deployed in order to evict it.

This type of operations involves displaced people being forced to move their tents and belongings, anywhere between 2 to 500 meters; personal belongings and basic necessities are often stolen and/or destroyed. These operations of harassment are also often accompanied by abusive identity checks, arrests, violent intimidation of displaced people, attacks on the physical and psychological integrity of displaced people. An overall objective is to witness as much as possible the police operations in order to document these practices and to serve as a form of deterrence against them. The ultimate goal is call for the State violence against displaced communities to end, through advocacy initiatives and legal actions.

In Calais and Grande-Synthe, the prefectural authority and the competent district prosecutor's office have clearly subverted and exploited the legal basis of the evictions. Gathering and presenting consistent evidence and documents related to daily evictions allow to demonstrate the illegal nature of this modus operandi.

Most displaced lose all of their assets following the police operations and has to leave behind essential personal belongings: tents, tarps, sleeping bags and blankets, bags, backpack.

Finally, aggressive policing reinforces several impediments to humanitarian aid and the activities carry out by the associations to ensure essential services to people in need (NFI, water and food distributions) are consistently threatened.
